Call to Prayer

During a vacation some years back, which—as wonderful and needful as that time of rest was—I felt hollow inside. Even my prayer life seemed to go strangely quiet, with only gentle bubbles of rather lazy appreciation for beauty springing to the surface of my heart throughout the days.

The fact is, you and I were made for work! Not just the work we do in exchange for a paycheck, but the common vocation we engage because we have given our lives to the Lord Jesus. In giving our lives to Jesus, we discover that there is something that our Lord wants us to do—pray. And despite the volumes written and sermons preached, if I am to be honest, there is nothing in my Christian life quite as challenging and counter-intuitive as this work of prayer.

In what sense is prayer *work*? I would not argue that it is work because something is accomplished by virtue of our doing it. If prayer had some sort of straightforward causal function, it would suggest that we, rather than God, were in the driver's seat. Not so! Prayer for me is work because it is a vigorous expression of belief and belief is hard work. In John 6, when the disciples ask Jesus what they must do to do the works of God, Jesus says “believe in the one he has sent.”

When we pray we are joining the likes of blind Bartemaeus who cried out with importunity as Jesus passed on the road, “Lord, have mercy upon me!” We entreat and implore because we can't fix the things that are wrong. Yet, there is nothing weak and pathetic about the prayers we direct towards our Lord.

To turn to God in prayer is not the same as shrugging our shoulders and saying nothing can be done. Our prayer is a faith stand—a vigorous expression of confidence, an insistence that God is indeed the One before whom our complaint and appeal must be laid. And even more challenging is the sobering realization that we have been commissioned by Jesus himself to not only cry out our appeal, but to carry his very authority in prayer!

As with any kind of work, our capacity increases as we engage it on a consistent basis. There is no more meaningful and important work to be done! What prayer work is God asking you to do?

Ways to Pray

Focus on prayer for the Muslim world during the month of Ramadan

Prayer is a practice common to both Christians and Muslims. Followers of both faiths pray for similar reasons: to engage their minds on the ways of God; to gain understanding of his will and find the strength to pursue it; to seek comfort and help; as a means of sharing the deepest thoughts of their hearts with the one in whom they put their trust. So, why do we pray for Muslims?

We Pray to Change Our Hearts

We gain our understanding of Muslims through what we experience and what we hear. Yet our experiences and knowledge will be limited. For some, experiences and knowledge will lead them to view Muslims with fear or animosity, while others will view them with warmth and concern, and yet others with indifference. When we pray for others as Jesus taught us to, we begin to see who we pray for through his eyes. The first command of Jesus was to love others as he loves us. To love Muslims, we must be willing to allow God to direct our understanding of who they are and to see them as God does. So we pray to gain an understanding of God's heart for Muslims the world over.

We Pray to Change the World

Christians believe that through prayer we can affect change in the world. We believe God works with us to accomplish his will and that in prayer we can encourage miraculous things to happen. Muslim people come from enormously diverse cultures and societies and their needs are varied and unique. Prayer helps us to understand these needs and how to respond to them. We pray for the needs of Muslims because that is one way we can love. We pray also for Muslims to gain a greater understanding of Jesus. We realize that as his followers, we often fail to represent Jesus well. Therefore, we do not pray for Muslims to become like us—we pray for them to become like Jesus. We pray that they will join us on the journey towards experiencing that abundant life of which Jesus spoke and towards establishing his kingdom of peace on earth.
